Milling about with New Buck Soc goes through the mill

How different would our flat and fertile landscape have looked in the 13th century? One striking feature would have been the distinctive silhouettes of the numerous windmills that characterised the area for 500 years. There were at least five in Old Buckenham, and that's without coming closer than the Dam Brigg!

Many of us remember the restoration of the last remaining mill in Old Buckenham when the cap and sails were replaced in 1996. It is now open to the public on the second Sunday afternoon of the summer months and there are plans to restore the machinery when funds are available. About 20 members and friends of the New Buckenham Society visited the mill in August and were showed round by members of the Windmill Committee. Our guides were so enthusiastic and encouraging that despite a few qualms we all made the very top of the 5 floors, although some of us were a little challenged vertically and circumferentially at times, as we navigated low beams and tight trapdoors!

Old Buckenham mill, built to accommodate 5 grinding wheels, has the largest diameter of any tower mill in the country. Although it has not been a working mill since 1926, memories of the lovely creaky sound effects that accompanied Windy Miller at Camberwick Green came flooding back as we climbed up! Our guides explained the process and answered questions, interpreting the illustrated panels at each level, which also included some other fascinating local stories like that of Prince Duleep Singh. The highest floor contains the track round which the cap and sails trundle to face the wind, and here, one could gaze out at the cottage gardens and sense something of another age.

In true NBS fashion, the trip was concluded with very excellent refreshments in the church rooms, including one of Shirley's legendary cakes, made this time in the shape of a windmill, with outstandingly delicious cheese biscuits to match. The windmill committee was presented with a print of David Seville's lovely water colour of the mill as a token of our appreciation. Thanks go also to David and the NBS committee for organising such a perfect summer outing. The mill is open to the public on the second Sunday of the summer months, and well worth a visit.

It wasn't until I got home and read the guide book more carefully that I remembered that I had a distant family connection to the mill - the last owner, Herbert Hilton, being my sons' great uncle - so I think, Ken, that I was fated to write this article!

Eastern Angles and High Tide production of:

I Caught Crabs in Walberswick

By Joel Horwood. Directed by Lucy Kerbel

There was a good attendance at the Village Hall on Saturday evening, 20th. September 2008, to see this play. This was unsurprising since previous productions have been well presented - especially last year's outstanding offering: 'Truckstop'

This one had a local theme although it could have been set in any 'Chelsea by the sea' seaside town. The production maintained its traditional high standard with a minimalist set, good lighting, excellent direction and outstanding performances by all especially Gemma Soul as Dani.

It would probably be more appropriate for a family with teenage kids to write this review rather than us, since they would be better able to judge the problems presented against real life events. But perhaps we can be more dispassionate! We did experience a slight 'déjà vu' since there was a distinct similarity between this script and the James Dean 1955 film: 'Rebel Without a Cause'.

The plot involves three teenagers from different social backgrounds. Each with a dysfunctional, and for two of them, a broken parental relationship. They meet on the beach at Walberswick and 'enjoy' an evening and night together - clubbing, boozing, experimenting with adolescent sex and soft drugs, and illegal drunken car driving. While the parents maintain their own equally un-Victorian, but perhaps twenty-first century life styles (Questionably not all that dissimilar from that of their kids!)

Altogether an interesting and enjoyable if rather disturbing evening's 'entertainment'. The programme did warn us that the play was for an audience of '16+' and did contain 'strong language'. But did we have to have the 'f' word used quite so often, and was it necessary for so much farting from one of the fathers? Too much can reduce the effect, ceases to be amusing, and becomes an irritation. But with the talent available to Eastern Angles and a series of new plays in the pipeline, next year's production should be even finer.

But fear keeps them at a distance until one night, in streetlight and shadows, the children confront an evil born of ignorance and blind hatred and must somehow find their way home
