New Buckenham Parish Council

Our Annual Parish Meeting took place on Tuesday 9th April, giving all parishioners the opportunity to hear about the work of the Parish Council over the previous twelve months and to enjoy drinks and nibbles afterwards. For those of you who were unable to attend, my report is summarised here:

"Tonight you will hear about the work of the Parish Council over the last 12 months, during which we have remained mainly unchanged, so thank you very much to Andrew, who has been vice-chair, Mary D., Mary M., Don and Steve, who all remained on the Council after elections last May. Andrew Nettleton decided to stand down at the election, but we would like to thank him for his work on the Parish Council. We only received one applicant who applied to be co-opted on to the Council and that was from Paul Martin who had previously been a Parish Councillor. We are delighted to have him back – you see, being a Parish Councillor's not too bad!

For some years now, it has not just been about attending a meeting every month, but so many other things as well. Additional responsibilities are currently allocated as follows:

- a) Allotments Mary M. and Paul
- b) Cemetery Paul
- c) Village Hall Committee Andrew
- d) Footpaths & Highways Andrew and Steve
- e) Play Area Don
- f) High Bailiff's Trust Karen

g) Community Project Fund Group – Karen, Mary D. and Paul (plus two residents of New Buckenham: Gerry Walsh and Andrew Nettleton)

h) Finance – Karen, Andrew and Don, plus the Clerk

i) Insertion of précised monthly PC Minutes in *Parish News* to further publicise the work of the Parish Council – Mary D.

j) William Barber Trust – Mary D.

You will be hearing about various aspects of the work of the Parish Council during this meeting, but I do just want to mention a few of the happenings over the last 12 months:

- We have worked with the relevant authorities to obtain a Faculty to extend the burial of ashes area in the churchyard and to re-use identified graves over 75 years without headstones and untended as we don't have many spaces left in the cemetery.
- Period Pointing has done two weeks' work on the churchyard wall and will return in May to do another two weeks' work. This is in addition to the maintenance work done by Broadland Tree Services in both areas over the year.
- We partly funded the excellent Coronation Party arranged by Mandy Hartley and her fantastic team.
- Councillors considered, but rejected the idea of turning off the street lights over night.
- Myself and three members of the SpeedWatch team attended the Police SNAP meeting in Attleborough. There was much discussion about speeding in all the villages represented, but unfortunately no ready solutions.
- We have financially supported The Villager and Parish News.
- After many setbacks and delays and thanks, eventually, to a grant from County Broadband, our defibrillator has been installed on the wall of the King's Head. Thank you Simon and thanks to Sue Britton and her team of volunteers who are monitoring it. A reminder that in an emergency, your first action MUST be to dial 999. You will then be given the code

for the defibrillator and support until the ambulance arrives.

- Our Clerk, Angela, has achieved her Certificate in Local Council Administration after many, many hours of hard work. Well done, Angela.
- Our website has been completely updated thank you again Angela – and we are about to launch new specific Parish Council emails in order that we don't need to use our personal email addresses.
- We also have involvement in the Community Project Fund and New Buckenham Community Car Scheme, both of which you will hear about in a moment.

That gives you a picture of some of the work of the Parish Council over the last twelve months. So much work involves many 'thank yous', a flavour of which are as follows:

Special thanks to Steve Askew, our Breckland Councillor and Norfolk County Councillor, who attends meetings when his busy schedule allows. He has always been available when we need him and has supported us throughout the year. Special thanks to Steve for his efforts to obtain a reduction to the speed limit on the B1113.

Phil Anderson and his team for their sterling work on Grounds Maintenance in the Cemetery, the Play Area, the Cricket Pitch, the Churchyard and various other projects around the village.

Gerry for her work on the Community Car Scheme and Alice Cattermole. who has recently taken over as co-ordinator. Thanks also to the drivers.

Mandy Hartley and her group who organised a fabulous celebration of the Coronation.

Sue Felton who has set up Speedwatch in the village and her group who are making fantastic inroads into reducing speeding.

Thank you also to everyone else who has contributed in many ways.

Thank you also to the *Parish News* team who have supported us in keeping the village up-dated with the activities of the Parish Council.

I will finish with another thank you to my fellow councillors and a reminder that Parish Council meetings are held on the second Tuesday of every month with the exception of August, when we don't normally meet. Dates of meetings and minutes of previous meeting are in Parish News. Agendas are on the noticeboard and on our website. Our next meeting will be held on Tuesday 14th May at 7:30pm at the Village Hall.

News from the Pews

Holy Week and Easter Services: We marked Good Friday with a reflective hour of music, readings and periods of silence. Those who had dedicated lilies to the memory of loved ones placed them in a candlelit arrangement where they decorated the church over the whole Easter period. On Easter Sunday we enjoyed a service of Holy Communion, with music, spring flowers and of course chocolate to take home! Many thanks to all who contributed in any way to this special weekend.

Coffee Mornings: Village & Vestry, our 'Friends' group, opened the season for us with a coffee morning on 23rd March in aid of church funds. With live music, colourful stalls selling cards, jam and crafts, as well as the usual raffle and book stall, it was a jolly event and raised £338. Thank you from all at St Martin's!

Our own CoffeeMates! programme started on 13th April, when we welcomed Heidi Glendenning from the Kenninghall Pantry, part of the Nourishing Norfolk Network. She told us about their work, which was quite an eye opener, and we raised £241.80 to support them.

This month, we are raising funds for the Dogs Trust, who have a centre at Snetterton, and Cats Protection, with a base in Norwich. No Mow May

In 2019, in response to the alarming and continuing loss of wildflowers and their habitat, the charity Plantlife (founded in 1989 with the King as patron) set up the movement No Mow May. Their reasoning was the number of private and public lawns, if not cut, may compensate for the loss of wild flowers in other places around the country.

According to the Director at Kew Gardens, since 1930, 97% of our wild-flower meadows have been lost. This is having a huge impact on the pollinators which need the flowers as a food source, creating a negative chain reaction for other insects and the birds which need them. The chain then links to mammals and, at the very end of the chain, has a real impact on the food WE eat.

During the height of the wild-flower season, a one-acre meadow can have up to 3,000,000 flowers, producing 1kg of nectar sugar - enough to support 96,000 honey bees a day.

It is important to have a variety of flowers, as not every species is attracted to every plant. Many will only feed and breed on one or two. So, the greater variety of plants and grasses, the greater number of insects will be there feeding and laying their eggs. Different heights of plants and grasses are also needed as they create shade which helps to hold the moisture to the ground. Only needing a pond in which to breed, frogs and toads need areas of moisture in which to live.

Growing up in the 60s and 70s, I can remember an abundance of wildflower varieties. On our long and invariably wet and muddy adventures 'over the woods' or 'over Weald', we would come home with handfuls of bluebells or whatever else happened to be in season.

It was possible to collect many flowers from the verges on our walk to school along the straight mile, making a display for the nature table or posy for the teacher's desk. Impromptu whole-class nature walks happened in the summer, when we picked and learned the names of the flowers. This culminated in a competition to create a scrapbook of what became rather wilted blooms stuck in with Sellotape alongside a laboriously written description of its virtues.

Moving to New Buckenham from the busy south-east coast eight years ago, I was struck that many of the wild flowers still growing here I'd not seen for years. During the respite from the first lockdown in 2020, I was keen to show my daughter how the hedgerows and verges would have looked half a century before in the south-east. With reduced pollution levels from the banning of air and road journeys, the flowers in the ditches, field-banks and hedgerows along Cuffer Lane were sublime. But, to my distress, they were dead. Cut down. Decimated. Left to rot down with the wilted flowers offering no nectar or pollen for insects or bees and no chance for the flowers to set seed for the following year. It is unlikely to have been Norfolk County Council's contractor on such an insignificant lane; probably, just a job seen to be needed doing as it always has been. It has not been as beautiful since.

In the 1990s, Norfolk County Council introduced the Roadside Nature Reserve Scheme, run jointly with the Norfolk Wildlife Trust. There are now 224 schemes, equating to 53 miles of flower-rich verges. Every scheme is marked by a post at each end identifying the area of special interest. New schemes are being added every year. At the appropriate time, once the flowers have set seed for the following year, the reserves are cut and the cuttings removed. This prevents the ground from becoming too nutrient rich, as wild flowers thrive on more impoverished soil.

Even if not part of the scheme, roadside verges are crucial habitats for rare and declining species of plants, insects and small animals. Covering almost 311,000 miles across the country, these narrow strips of land are becoming increasingly important. With the loss of so many meadows, pollinating insects are having to travel further to find the flowers vital to their species. Ultimately, this makes them weaker genetically and more vulnerable to changes in the environment.

Many roads across the country developed from ancient trackways. Over hundreds of years and many generations, the roadsides were used for grazing and left uncut through the spring and summer months. At the appropriate time, they would be cut with a hand-held scythe, which maintains a higher level of biodiversity than machine cutting. The cuttings were raked and collected and used for hay. As such, these fragments of ancient ground are unimproved grassland, much like the area of Market Place under the lime trees, growing important scarce or unusual plants.

Not all verges are suitable to be part of the Roadside Nature Reserve Scheme. Tarmac, NCC's contractor, has two cutting programmes: one for urban roads and one for rural roads. This is done between May and September to one swathe/metre width for safety, providing sufficient visibility at junctions and unrestricted passage on pavements. Where some vegetation encroaches on hard surfaces, causing damage, the council uses Glyphosate [Weedol] weedkiller once a year in late spring/early summer, although there has been controversy concerning Glyphosate throughout Europe. NCC's use is covered by their 2022 Glyphosate Policy Document.

The 1947 Agricultural Act required farmers to increase food production. Farming practices became more intensive requiring larger fields and bigger more efficient machinery. As a result, 50% of hedgerows were destroyed with a disastrous and devastating effect on biodiversity, as well as the damage caused by insecticides and herbicides.

The increase in size of many towns and villages, and the ongoing pressure to build more houses also has a detrimental effect on biodiversity. It is easy to blame farming methods as a major cause of harm, but, although the building of new roads is widely protested, the problems this causes do not seem to be as comprehensively documented.

With what may feel like uncontrollable wholesale destruction of what is important to us, just not cutting your lawn, or leaving a small area of your garden to its own devices for a few months may seem pointless. It isn't.

Throughout the country, it is estimated there are nearly two million acres of private garden. If even a small number of owners were to consider adopting No Mow May the impact in creating wildlife corridors would be significant. Although a relatively small and compact community we, too, can open up and link those vitally important corridors. And, while you're not mowing, take that time to watch just what you are doing for the tiny creatures we so depend on!
